This late 17th/early 18th century milling, farming and trading complex was once part of the Philipse estate, tenanted by European farmers

and operated by enslaved Africans. A walk across the millpond bridge takes visitors to the heart of Sleepy Hollow country. Historic Sites and Museums

Bedford 1787 Court House

Route 22 at the Village Green, Bedford, 234-9751

Westchester County's oldest government building, northern county seat from 1787 to 1870, managed by the Bedford Historical Society. Restored first floor court room; local history museum on second floor. Restored 1829 "Stone Jug" School House on Village Green; Historic Hall, next to the Old Burying Ground, built in 1806 as a Methodist church, was moved in 1837 by 20 yoke of oxen to its present site. Open Mar. – Dec., Thurs. – Sat., 12 – 3pm, and by appointment.

Croton's Little Museum

1 Van Wyck Street, Croton-on-Hudson, 271-4574

A collection of documents, images and artifacts showcasing the history of Croton-on-Hudson. Housed in the Croton Municipal Bldg. and maintained by the village Historian Joyce Finnerty and Croton Historical Society. Exhibits change every 6 months. Open Mon. – Fri., 9 – 4 pm.

Cudner-Hyatt House

937 Post Road, Scarsdale, 723-1744

Two-story, clapboard farmhouse built in the 1740's and listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Appointed with mid-19th century furnishing, textiles and tools, it reflects the lives of the Cudners (1734-1836) and the Hyatts (1836-1972). Open year-round. Mon. – Fri., 10 am – 4 pm. Weekends by appointment.

A collection of archives, artifacts and photographs relating to the history of the riverside village incorporated in 1879, housed in an historic observatory. The furnished country home of Horace Greeley, 1864-1872, the crusading editor of *The New York Tribune*, a Presidential candidate in 1872, a foe of slavery and an advocate of women's rights. Guided tour and exhibits focus on Greeley and the history of New Castle. Open year-round. Tues. – Thurs. and Sat., 1 – 4 pm.

North Castle Historical Society's Education Complex**440 Bedford Road, Armonk, 273-4510**

Historic Smith's Tavern, Brundage Blacksmith Shop, East Middle Patent One-Room Schoolhouse and 1798 Quaker Meeting House. Captain John Smith's Tavern, listed on the National Register of Historic Places, served as a Colonial militia headquarters, stagecoach stop, town hall, voting place and post office. Brundage Blacksmith Shop and the One-Room East Middle Patent School served the community's needs well into the 20th century. Period antiques and furnishings. Open for tours Apr. - Nov., excluding holidays, on Wed., 2 - 4 pm, Sun., 2 - 5 pm; and by appointment.

Old Dutch Church and Burying Ground**42 North Broadway, Tarrytown, 631-1123**

This sacred edifice and adjoining burying ground is considered the oldest functioning church and cemetery in the State of New York. Built by Frederick Philipse in 1685, the simple interior features a distinctive wooden pulpit and sounding-board canopy. Cemetery tours are given every Sun. at 2pm, Memorial Day weekend through the end of Oct. Group tours are by appointment.

Ossining Historical Society Museum**196 Croton Avenue, Ossining, 941-0001**

Housed in the 1872 Austin House, the museum contains collections and exhibits of antiques and memorabilia such as maps, military artifacts, photographs, furniture and items from Sing Sing Prison reflecting local Ossining history from 1785. Open year-round, Tues., Wed. & Sun., 1 - 4 pm, and by appointment.

Exhibits, "Up the River: Sing Sing Prison" includes a replica of the Sing Sing electric chair, a prison cell from 1825, a present-day cell and the history of penology. "Down the River: The Old Croton Aqueduct" describes the 40-mile-long aqueduct built in 1843. Open year-round. Mon. - Sat., 10 am - 4 pm.

Peekskill Museum**124 Union Avenue, Peekskill, 736-0473**

Seven room house-museum features local historical artifacts. Once home to the Herrick

family, the house was designed by famous architect William Rutherford Mead in 1877. Three permanent exhibits: the Ladies Victorian Bedroom, the Marion Boyle Children's Room and the Peekskill Stove Collection. Open June - Dec., Saturday 1 - 3 pm and by appointment.

Philipse Manor Hall State Historic Site**29 Warburton Avenue (at Dock Street), Yonkers, 965-4027**

A National Historic Landmark and official project of Save America's Treasures, this high-style Georgian mansion, built in stages between 1682 and 1755, was home to the wealthy Loyalist, Fredrick Philipse III. Features an original 1750's papier-mâché ceiling and 1868 Gothic Chamber. Open Apr.-Oct., Tues.-Sun., 12 - 5 pm. Nov.-Mar., Tues.-Sun., 12 - 4 pm. Groups by appointment.
